Our Inspiration: Jesus Christ (Add Photo)

Jesus (also called Christ which means King or Messiah) was born in Israel 2000 years ago. Modern civilization marks his birth by dividing the time into B.C. (before Christ) and A.D. (Anno Domini - or the year of our Lord). For his first thirty years, Jesus lived a traditional Jewish life, working as a carpenter. During this time, all of Israel was under Caesar's Roman dictatorship, including Bethlehem, where Jesus was born, and Nazareth, where he was raised.

In his thirties, Jesus began his public teaching and display of recorded miracles, yet still never travelled more than 200 miles from his birthplace. Over a three year period, despite his efforts to keep a low profile, Jesus' reputation spread nationwide. The Roman governors and rulers of Israel's provinces and the leaders of the Jewish people (the religious counsels) took note of him. Jesus' key messages included:

- God loves you and is with you
- Love one another
- Immense value of each person
- Good news: kingdom of God has come to earth
- Reality of judgment to heaven or hell
- God forgives those who ask

Many have asked "Who is Jesus Christ?" Jesus' most controversial act was that he repeatedly claimed to be God, which was a direct violation of the Jewish law. Therefore the religious leaders asked the Roman government to execute him.

In each of several official trials, the Romans found that he was not guilty of breaking any Roman law. Even the Jewish leaders recognized that other than Jesus' claim to be God, Jesus followed the Jewish law perfectly. Still the religious leaders, using the argument of political disfavor, persuaded Pilate, a Roman governor of the Southern province of Israel, to authorize an execution.

Jesus was brutally tortured and then hung by his hands, which were nailed to a horizontal wooden beam (cross). This method of execution restricted the airflow to his lungs, killing him in three hours. However, according to more than 500 witnesses, Jesus returned from the dead three days later, and over the next 40 days journeyed in both the southern and northern provinces of Israel. To many, this was conclusive proof that Jesus' claims to be God were real. Then Jesus returned to Jerusalem, the city where he was recently executed, and according to witnesses, he left the earth alive by rising up into the sky.

As a result of these miraculous events, the number of his followers increased dramatically. Only a few months later in that same city of Jerusalem one record states that some 3000 new followers were added in a single day. The religious leaders responded by trying to stomp out Jesus' followers. Many of these people chose to die rather than deny their belief that Jesus was truly God.

Within 100 years, people throughout the Roman empire (Asia Minor, Europe) became followers of Jesus. In 325 AD, the following of Jesus, Christianity, became the official religion of the Roman Emperor Constantine. Although some of Jesus' messages and teachings were diluted or miscommunicated through the expansion of a religious institution, Jesus' original words and life still speak loudly for themselves.

Our Founder: St Kuriakose Elias Chavara (Add Photo)

Christ College of Science and Management was born out of the educational vision of St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara (1805-1871), an educationalist and a social reformer of the nineteenth century in South India. He was born on 10th February 1805, Kainakary, near Alappuzha, Kerala. In his childhood, Kuriakose attended the village school where he studied language and elementary sciences. He entered the seminary in 1818 and was ordained a priest in 1829.

His life was fully dedicated to the service of humanity. He organized the fellow priests to preach retreats in whole churches that time. He ordered to start schools attached to every parish to educate the people when the education was not available for the ordinary people. He was aware about the consequences of ignorance and he himself started a Sanskrit School, when the Sanskrit education was prohibited for the lower caste. He did whatever was good for his people with a futuristic vision. He was available as a priest and a friend of needy and poor. This concern for others compelled him to establish charity homes for the poor, physically disabled, mentally challenged brethren.

He found that starting schools were not sufficient to eradicate ignorance of the ordinary people. Good inspiring books and information should reach the hands of farmers who were struggling for the livelihood. So, he visited the Government press which was the only press in Malabar that time and made a copy of that printing machine with the help of a carpenter. His zeal to spread the Gospel through this wooden printing machine later lead to the birth of an Indian daily called Deepika and it is still continuing with its heritage of centuries. This made a revolution in the field of mass media in

Kerala. He learned regional languages and wrote so many spiritual articles, books and made them available to the people. He was a social reformer in his action and a contemplative religious person in his heart. Recognizing and appreciating the contributions to the society, the Indian Government released a postal stamp with his image in 1987. The nation and church cannot forget or hide the creative and innovative contributions in the fields of education, social apostolate, charity services, media, pastoral caring and spiritual formation, education for women, formation of priests for the universal church etc.

- He died on 3rd January 1871 and canonized by Pope John Paul II at Kottayam, Kerala on 8th February 1986. He was canonized on 23rd November 2014 in Rome by Pope Francis.
- St. Chavara founded the congregation of Carmelites of Mary Immaculate (CMI), in 1831 with a vision to serve the marginalized and underprivileged. The first indigenous catholic religious congregation of India today has more than 3000 priests serving in different parts of the world. The CMI congregation inspired by the vision of St. Chavara, renders its service in educational, social, health care and other sectors aiming at the integral development of the society.

Programme Overview

It follows triple major system wherein students study Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics as major subjects. This three-year programme paves way for taking up postgraduate programmes in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics.

Physics

Major papers in Physics include Mechanics, Heat and Thermodynamics, Electricity and Magnetism, Optics and Fourier Series, Statistical Physics, Quantum Mechanics – I, Atmospheric Physics and Nanomaterials, Astrophysics, Solid State Physics and Semiconductor Physics, Atomic, Molecular and Nuclear Physics, Electronics, Magnetic Materials, Dielectrics and Quantum Mechanics etc. The students develop application projects prescribed in the syllabus during the respective semesters. They also engage in various knowledge enrichment activities.

Mathematics

The curriculum consists of intensive and extensive topics like Differential Equations, Linear Algebra, Groups, Rings, Fields, Vector Spaces, Vector Algebra, Vector Calculus, Real Analysis, Vector Mechanics, Numerical Analysis, Complex Analysis, Calculus and Advanced Calculus etc. enabling the student to transform the mathematical interests to other intellectual endeavours.

Chemistry

This course incorporates fundamental and exciting developments of chemistry as detailed insight into different branches of chemistry like organic, inorganic and physical chemistry and their applications.

BA JPEng (JOURNALISM, PSYCHOLOGY, ENGLISH LITERATURE)

Programme Overview

Journalism

The course aims at moulding the student for a career in Journalism, both print and broadcasting and in allied fields like Advertising, Film, and Public Relations. The course introduces various facets of journalism to the students with theoretical knowledge and on the job training. The course is a part of the four BA triple main combinations and consists of eight subject titles stretching all the semesters. The major papers include Reporting, Editing, Media Laws, Basic Audio-Visual Media and Media Management. Furthermore, the Department stresses a balance between the theoretical and practical elements of journalism and mass communication, and the curriculum is carefully tailored to prepare students for professional or academic careers in communication, giving them the broad liberal arts education necessary to succeed as communicators in today's complex and changing world.

Psychology

A course in psychology equips the students with an in-depth knowledge in various aspects like child psychology, industrial psychology, counselling, personality development etc. In addition to the theory papers, the students have practical papers every year which will give them practical insight into the subjects.

English Literature (Optional English)

English has been an integral part of various walks of life in India for centuries. One might even say that it has become inseparable from the essence of contemporary Indian culture. The study of language is a key to attain an understanding of the history of any age. The three-year English Literature course, also known as Optional English, offers students an opportunity to understand the literary, cultural and social dynamism of England's varied past, European and Non-European writing and integrates Indian writing in English facilitating a transcendence of linguistic nativism.

A student securing 40% aggregate marks including languages in P.U.C / 10 +2 / Pre-University equivalent course is eligible.

Attendance

For the purpose of calculating attendance, each semester shall be taken as a Unit. A student shall be considered to have satisfied the requirement of attendance for the semester, if he/she has attended not less than 85% in aggregate of the number of working hours in each of the subjects compulsorily. A student who fails to complete the course in the manner stated above shall not be permitted to take the University examination.

The marks based on attendance shall be awarded as given below:

- 95% to 100% = 05 marks.
- 90% to 94% = 04 marks.
- 85% to 89% = 03 marks.
- 80% to 84% = 02 marks.

• Greater than 75% = 01 mark.

Marks for skill development shall be awarded by the faculty concerned based on Skill Development exercises provided in the syllabus of each paper. The student is required to prepare/workout the concerned exercises in a Record Book maintained by him/her and shall submit to the faculty concerned at least 15 days before the last date of the semester.

Record Maintenance and Submission

In every semester, the student should maintain a Record Book in which a minimum of 5 exercises/programs per subject are to be recorded. This Record has to be submitted to the Faculty for evaluation at least 15 days before the end of each semester.

B. University Examinations

The Odd Semester Examinations are usually held in October-November and the Even Semester, in May-June. The dates and fees of each semester examinations will be duly notified on the notice board of the college.

Minimum for Pass

Candidates who have obtained a minimum of 35% marks in university examination (i.e. 25 marks out of 70 marks of theory examination) and 40% in aggregate (i.e., total of university examination and internal assessment marks) in each subject shall be eligible for a pass or exemption in that subject.

Terms and Conditions

A candidate is allowed to carry all the previous unclear papers to the subsequent semester/semesters. Such of those candidates who have failed/remained absent for one or more papers henceforth called as repeaters, shall appear for exam in such paper/s during the three immediately succeeding examinations. There shall be no repetition for internal assessment test. The candidate shall take the examination as per the syllabus and the scheme of examination in force during the subsequent appearances.

Eligibility conditions to receive hall ticket and appear for University Examination

- Admission procedures done and admission eligibility documents submitted on time.
- Minimum 85% attendance for each course.
- Paid the examination fees and all other fees.
- No objection certificate from Library.
- No disciplinary complains from the class Tutors/ HOD/ Management.

In reference to Ministry of Women & Child Development's D.O. Letter No. 19-8/2014-WW dated 14th January 2015, regarding constitution of Internal Complaint Committee as per Section 4 of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act 2013.

Executing above directions an internal complaint committee is constituted at Christ College to prevent sexual harassment at workplace. A written compliant is required to be taken from the aggrieved person to take the necessary actions. The committee carries out inquiry to sort the matter. Also provides counselling and conciliation to the aggrieved person.

Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell has been established to provide a healthy and congenial atmosphere to the staff and students of the College to work together in an environment free of violence, harassment, exploitation, and intimidation. The cell is working with an objective to provide protection against sexual harassment and for prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and matters connected therewith and incidental thereto. The cell promotes behaviors that create an atmosphere that ensures gender equality and equal opportunities.

SC/ST Harassment Prevention Cell

Any kind of discrimination on the basis of caste, creed, religion, language, ethnicity, gender and disability is strictly prohibited in Christ College. CCSM will be very sensitive while dealing with incidents of caste discrimination and a strict action will be taken against such cases. The Officials/faculty members should also desist from any act of discrimination against SC/ST students on grounds of their social origin. CCSM also ensures that no official/ faculty member indulge in any kind of discrimination against any community or category of students. CCSM will take strict action against the erring official / faculty member, if any such incident comes to the notice of the authorities.

STUDENT DEVELOPMENT CENTRES

Counselling Cell

The counselling cell provides counselling related to academic, career and personal counselling. It provides counseling related to academic choices during the admissions process to enable students to decide upon their course of study. Teachers are always available within College and students can approach them with their academic problems. The College organizes talks with experts from various fields for the students to learn about prospective careers. There are staff trained in psychology and counselling to help students with their psychological and emotional problems.

Mentoring

Mentoring is a close individualized relationship that develops over time between a student and a faculty member and that included both caring and guidance. The mentor will care about students as a person, make them excited about learning and encourage them to pursue their dreams. Every student will have a mentor from the faculty. Each student should have a mentoring session once in a month. Mentoring will be a continuous process till the end of the course in the campus.

College Volunteer Body

The volunteer body consists of 50+ students from various departments. They help organize and coordinate various college events such as cultural fests, seminars, conferences etc. These events are conducted in the college throughout the academic year. They are also trained in various activities that pertain to leadership, problem solving, time management and team building.

Placement Cell

The Placement Office facilitates the students to explore the world of employment and new career avenues. It also helps students in career planning through counseling where in they gather information about themselves in terms of their interests, aptitudes and abilities so that they can choose their career more effectively. The objective of the Placement Office is also on the professional development of the students by training them towards employability skills such as resume building, group discussion and interview skills which in turn helps the students to move into a desired occupation and/or apply in prestigious postgraduate and professional schools

responsibility, development of personality and an aptitude for leadership, and the inculcation of the principles and practice of military service.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

NSS acquaints the students with voluntary social service through participatory manual work the teachers themselves giving the lead and guidance. With "Not Me, But You", as its motto, NSS expresses the essence of democratic living and upholds the need for selfless service and appreciation of another man's point of view and promotes consideration for fellow human beings. NSS strives to teach the students that the welfare of an individual is ultimately dependent on the welfare of the society as a whole. Therefore, seeks to demonstrate this aim in its day-to-day activities

The Student Council

The Student Council is to promote quality in student life within and outside the College. It is a support system for the holistic development of the students and works in liaison with the General Administration and respective Departments of the College. The Student Council functions under the supervision of the Director Student-Council appointed by the Principal.

Objectives:

- To imbibe and inculcate among the students the vision, mission and core values of the College.
- To provide constructive feedback on various aspects of campus life academic programmes, general discipline, library facilities, maintenance of the campus and other student service facilities.
- To suggest the means for improving the academic quality and standards and the research culture among students.
- To suggest and implement student projects for their holistic development.
- To identify, assess, evaluate and suggest the student perspectives in the development of Arts and Culture, Sports and Games, and other co-curricular/extra-curricular activities involving student participation.
- To identify and suggest methods of improving student life and student conduct and discipline.
- To assist the anti-ragging committee to remove the menace of ragging completely.
- To assess and improve the potential for student placements and facilitate internships.
- To create and encourage an environment for healthy and effective use of student service facilities and suggest methods for its improvement.
- To help interlink students, faculty members, staff and management of the College effectively to forge a strong academic community.

- To help establish and maintain continuous and effective interaction with the alumni of the College.
- To help the students to keep the Christite spirit alive through various activities.

Constitution of the Council:

The Student Council is constituted by representatives of students chosen from all the UG/PG Programmes of the college. Number of the members in council may vary every academic year based on the new programmes introduced by the college. It consists of two representatives from each class with a minimum strength of 20 students. If the number is less than 20 only one member will be represented. In case of two members representing a class one would be a boy and other member would be a girl.

This body of the Council will also include one representative each from CSA, NCC, NSS, Cultural Team, Sports, Games Team etc. of the of the college, nominated by the Principal.

The Student Council shall act as a responsible body contributing to the Vision and Mission of the College and shall neither be an association nor a bargaining agency of the students. The Principal may dissolve the Council at his discretion at any time prior to its functional duration.

Nomination Procedure:

Students fulfilling the eligibility criteria such as academic performance (65%), percentage of attendance (85%), participation in events and activities of the department or college, holistic skills and the general standing are eligible to apply for council. Application form to be submitted to their respective class teachers along with a statement of purpose, a copy of the attendance and marks card of the previous semesters. The Class Teachers in consultation with HOD evaluate the statement of purpose, attendance and marks card and submit a list of eligible candidates to the Election Coordinator. The Election Coordinator shall then review the applications and interview the candidates. Based on the interview and other achievements two members are selected from each class in consultation with respective HOD's and class tutors. This student council will elect the office bearers for the academic year.

Schedule of Meetings:

The Student Council shall meet on a monthly basis with the Director of Student Council and convey the suggestions / feedbacks to improve the quality of life in the campus. A meeting shall also be held once in a semester with the Principal. The Principal convenes the meeting in which the Vice Principal, HODs and Student Council Staff Coordinators and council members participate without fail. The Student Council Coordinator along with the student council members from respective departments shall present the suggestions and feedback from department.

Attendance for the meetings is compulsory and absence for the same for two consecutive times without prior information and valid reasons shall impose termination of the member and a new member shall be appointed for the post.

CAMPUS CULTURE AND REGULATIONS

Deeply committed to upholding the value system of the college, it expects its students to conduct themselves in a worthy manner in their dress, demeanour and discipline. They must respect their teachers; greet them when they meet them in or out of the campus. They must rise when the teachers enters the class room, remain standing till they are directed to sit.

Students must be seated in their respective classrooms at the stroke of the bell. Students are expected to make use of library during free periods. Movement of students in the corridors of the college building during lecture hours or sitting on the staircases is not permitted.

Each working day has a forenoon session of four periods and an afternoon session of three periods. Second and fourth Saturdays of every month are holidays.

A. Timing

1. Each working day has a forenoon session of three periods and an afternoon session of three periods. Second and fourth Saturdays of every month are holidays. Class time: 9.05 am to 3.45 pm.

B. Attendance

- 1. As per the Bangalore North University norms, 75% attendance in each subject is the minimum requirement for examination eligibility. However, as part of its academic culture, Christ College holds it mandatory that every student shall put in at least 85% of actual attendance in each paper. Failure to achieve 85% of attendance will invite suitable censures.
- 2. Students with attendance below the required level will not be permitted to appear for the university examination.
- 3. In case of a genuine and urgent need to take leave, the student submits the application form for leave, duly signed by parent/guardian, to the class tutor. The class tutor grants leave up to maximum two days. Leave of absence for more than two consecutive days can be granted only by the Principal.
- 4. Application for leave of absence may be rejected by the tutor/HOD/Principal if he/she is not satisfied with its genuineness and the request will be considered only if the overall attendance is above 85%.
- 5. When absence is caused by unforeseen events, a hand-written application for leave signed by the student and parent/guardian will have to be produced to the tutor (for up to two days)/ Principal (for more than two days) before the student seeks entry into the class. Medical certificate should be attached to the leave application, when the leave is due to medical reasons.

- 6. Medical certificates should be submitted to the class tutor along with the leave application form within 3 days after resuming classes. Late submission of medical certificates will not be accepted. In a semester, the management will accept two valid medical certificates only. The medical leave form given in the end of the handbook need to be submitted and approval taken from class tutor, HOD and Principal when the medical certificate is furnished.
- 7. If a student fails to attend classes without sufficient reason and prior permission as mentioned above, suitable actions will be initiated. If a student fails to qualify for any two end-semester university exams due to shortage of attendance, the student will be required to leave the institution.
- A student who is absent from classes for two weeks or more continuously without the written permission of the principal/vice-principal will be considered to have left the College.
- 9. If a student takes leave / is absent on the day of CIA exams, he / she must take a retest. However CIA marks are considered only if the student takes prior permission.
- 10. Punctuality is an essential part of education and the students are expected to be in the class before the first bell. You shall devotedly participate in the Morning Prayer.
- 11. Late comers for the first period need to report to the principal and acquire a permission slip to enter the class.
- **12.** Attendance is marked at the commencement of the class. Latecomers, therefore, though permitted to attend class by the teacher concerned, will not be eligible for attendance. In case of intercollegiate events/ programmes, student has to get signature on the form given in the handbook from the class tutor, HOD and Event Coordinator before participating for the event.
- 13. Students going for any department/college or intercollegiate events/programme have to submit permission form, duly signed by the Program Co-ordinator, Class tutor, HOD and Principal to avail attendance.
- 14. Leave even for the part of the day will be granted only on the written application. Students shall not leave the college campus without permission and out pass.

Regulations of Bangalore North University Regarding Attendance

- Each semester shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of calculating attendance.
- 2. A student shall be considered to have completed a semester if he/she attended not less than 75% of the number of working periods in each of the subjects of study during the said semesters and if his/her conduct and progress have been satisfactory.
- 3. The college shall display attendance on the notice board at the end of every month. The attendance records of the students are calculated from the beginning of the semester till the end of that month

C. Uniform and Dress Code

- On all working days except on Saturdays the students are expected to be in formal dress in the campus. Those without proper dress code in all the respects will not be permitted to remain in the college campus. Students must compulsorily wear their college ID card at all times, while in the campus. If a student is seen entering into the campus without an ID card, he/she will not be allowed to enter the campus. The ID card should be well displayed and not to be hid in the pocket.
- 2. All students shall adhere to the dress code prescribed by the college.
- Dress Code: Boys are expected to be in full pants and clean shirts. Lowwaisted pants with several large pockets are not allowed.
- 4. Girls are expected to dress decently. Leggings and Jeggings are not allowed in the campus. Out of respect for Indian traditions, students should avoid wearing, tight, transparent, sleeveless, or revealing cloths and should dress appropriately.

D. Campus Culture Directives

- 1. Every Student of Christ College is called Christite and every Christite is expected to strive for excellence.
- Students shall abide by the rules and directives of the college and are expected to be worthy Christite nourished by the values of universal love and respect for each other.
- 3. Students should maintain a sense of decorum and discipline at all times, both inside and outside the campus. This requirement of discipline and silence is mandatory while attending classes as well as any function or programme organised in the campus.

- 4. Continuous striving for excellence, universal love, respect for others, and ardent pursuit of truth being the values we uphold, every student should pledge not to indulge in any of the following acts which are detrimental to the values mentioned above:
 - absenting from any class without valid reason and prior permission.
 - · shouting and whistling inside the class room
 - using mobile phone inside the college campus
 - causing damage to college property
 - being present inside the college premises under the influence of alcohol/drugs and possessing any intoxicant.
 - any act of disobedience to any of the members of the college, faculty and staff.
 - bullying, scuffle, fight and groupism adversely affecting the serene atmosphere of learning.
- Indulging in any of what is mentioned above is considered a serious act of indiscipline warranting serious and adequate disciplinary action.
- Students shall always wear their ID card around their neck and produce the same to any member of the staff or College officials when asked for.
- 7. Students are required to be at their seats before the stroke of the second bell for the commencement of classes. Students who report to the class after 9.10 are to be in the library, while losing their attendance for the first hour. Disciplinary actions will be initiated against frequent late-comers.
- No student is allowed to leave the classroom without the permission of the teacher or until the class is dismissed.
- Students shall not enter other classrooms without the permission of the Principal/Teachers.
- 10. As a gesture of respect, students shall greet teachers on first meeting them for the day within the premises of the College, and whenever they meet them in public. As the teacher enters the class room, students must rise from their seats, greet him/her and remain standing till directed to sit.
- 11. There should be complete silence on corridors during class hours to maintain an academic atmosphere. Students must not loiter on the corridors during the class hours.
- 12. Active participation in co-curricular activities is an excellent aid to students' striving for excellence and is mandatory for every student.
- 13. Moved by the rigor of academic goals of each student and the demands of excellence, each Christite should take into confidence his/her class-tutor and

- maintain a healthy relationship with him/her so as to take up with him/her any problem, academic or otherwise and to consult for arriving at a solution for the same.
- 14. Dress and general appearance of the students shall be in good taste and no way be offensive to the cultural ethos and norms.
- 15. Smoking, chewing gum, chewing pan and use of any addictive substance is strictly prohibited within the campus.
- 16. The campus must be kept clean and tidy at all times. The college is a temple of learning. Hence all the Christites are required to keep the beauty and the spiritual ambience of the campus. Littering and defacing the walls or desks, damaging college property are punishable offences.
- 17. Insubordination, habitual inattention, neglect of work, unbecoming language or conduct, obscenity in word or deed render a student liable to temporary or permanent dismissal.
- 18. Boys and girls are expected to conduct themselves with dignity and maturity. In their interpersonal relationships they must observe norms of decency, propriety and mutual respect. Any improper relationship will detract the students from their academic engagement and therefore, if noted, such students are liable for correction.
- 19. Movements of vehicles in the college campus must be in a moderate speed. Vehicles are to be parked in the allotted parking area and appropriate censors will be initiated against violators. While parking the vehicles in the campus students are to keep the order and keep their vehicles locked.
- 20. Motorized two wheelers will not be allowed in the campus without helmet.
- 21. The instructions given by the security officers in the campus are to be adhered to.
- 22. USE OF MOBILE PHONES: As indicated above, use of mobile phones can cause impediments to the academic focus of the student and may be detrimental to the learning atmosphere. Students are not permitted to use mobile phones anywhere inside the college building. If any student is found with mobile phones in switch on mode, it will be confiscated and will not be returned. Use mobile phones inside the campus for academic purpose.
- 23. Students are not allowed to carry with them or use in the campus/college any electrical or electronic gadget like CD players, digital cameras, radios, taperecords etc., without the prior permission from the Principal.
- 24. Active participation in politics is not allowed. Students are forbidden to organize or attend any meeting within the College or collect money for any

- purpose or to circulate among them any notice or petition of any kind or paste such objects on the College notice board without the written permission from the Principal. They must not join any club or society or make any engagement that would interfere with their studies without the permission of the Principal.
- 25. Functions of Associations, cultural programs including any kind of celebrations will be held after class hours and outside the class rooms. Practice for all programmes should be held either prior to or after the class hours.
- 26. In every thought, word and deed, Christites are expected to respect, uphold and communicate the dignity, decorum and honour of the institution.
- 27. Students showing disobedience and disrespect to the management and the staff members are liable to be dismissed.
- 28. Those who are guilty of serious misconduct or whose presence is detrimental to the order and discipline on the campus are liable to be expelled.
- 29. English is the medium of communication of the college. All communications in the class rooms and outside between the staff and students and among the students themselves shall be in English. Defaulters will be fined.
- 30. All teachers in the college, irrespective of class or department are entitled to take disciplinary action against any student of this college.
- 31. Students are not allowed to write or draw on the walls and furniture. Any damage made to the property of the college will have to be compensated. If the culprit cannot be detected the concerned class/group or all the students may be imposed a fine. The punishment is without prejudice to the liability of the delinquent student for prosecution under the Provisions of the Indian Penal Code or under the provisions of the Prevention of Damage to Public Properties Act.
- 32. Students shall not indulge or stage in any activity like boycotting the class, Dharna, Gherao, and obstructing entry to and from any class room, office, hall or places inside the campus.
- 33. No student of the college shall shout slogans inside the campus and interfere or cause disturbance to the functioning of the college.
- 34. Students should bring their parents to the college if requested by the authorities.
- 35. Grievances of the students shall be brought to the notice of the Principal

- 36. Students will not be permitted to make complaints in a body or present any collective petition but are welcome to present their case, if any, either individually or through their proper representatives.
- 37. In all cases of disputes the decision of the Principal (Management) will be final.

E. Library

The Library is functioning as an information disseminating centre catering to the needs of students and staff community. It has a major role in paving the way for better academic excellence. As the library is a place of serious study, the members should abide by a code of conduct inside the library so as to maintain a conducive atmosphere.

Library Timing: Monday to Saturday, 8.30 am – 4.30 pm

- 1. The Library remains closed on all Sundays and Public Holidays.
- 2. ID card and college dress code is mandatory to enter in library.
- 3. An atmosphere of perfect silence and studious aura should prevail in the library.
- 4. Books, files and other personal materials should not be taken into the library. Paper or notebooks may be taken inside the library. They have to leave their personal belongings in the property counter at the entrance. On entering the library, one should enter their name and signature in the registration book.
- 5. Students may borrow two books at a time. A book is issued for a period of 14 days, which may be renewed, if nobody demands it.
- 6. Readers will be responsible for any damage caused to the books. Pencil marks, ink-stain etc. made in a book will be treated as damage. If the book is already damaged at the time of issue, it should be reported to the library staff before the issue of book.
- 7. In case of loss of a book, the borrower shall replace the book. If the replacement is not done within 15 days, the defaulter will be charged two times the cost of the book if the book is in print or three times the cost if the book is out of print. However, the Librarian has the discretionary power to take the final decision. If a multi-volume set is damaged or lost the member concerned shall be liable to replace the whole set or pay the cost of the entire set in that series.
- 8. The Librarian has the right to recall any book on loan and cancel any reservation at any time.

- Reference books, Journals, Magazines and student dissertations are not issued to students for outside reference.
- 10. Members are not allowed to sub-lend the books issued to them.
- 11. All books should be returned before the commencement of the vacation.
- 12. Upon any infringement of the library rules members shall forfeit the privileges of membership of the library.
- 13. Absence from the college for any reason will not be an excuse for not returning the book in time.
- 14. Persistent defaulters of library rules will have their library services suspended.
- 15. Circulation timings: Monday Saturday: 12.15 1.00 pm
- 16. Issue of Books: Students can borrow two books at a time for a period of 14 days
- 17. Penalty for late return: Rs.5/day.

Book Bank Scheme

Library has a book bank facility to provide free text books to the economically less privileged students. Considering the high demand for issue of text books, book bank facility aims at ensuring the availability of such books to deserving students as a support to their studies. In every academic year students will be allowed to apply for the same, and the library committee will decide on the list of candidates who will be granted the provision

F. Parent - Teacher Association

Christ College maintains a good relationship with the parents of the students. Feedback from parents is valued to fine tune the academic program. Parent-Teachers Meet is organized once every semester wherein the student's performance in examinations, attendance etc., are discussed by the class mentors/ subject lecturers with parents/guardians. A core parent council is also instituted and meetings of the council are held from time to time.

G. College Bus

- College buses are the extension of the college campus. All the rules and regulations that are to be observed in the college campus should be adhered to in the college bus also.
- 2. All are expected to behave modestly and decently in the bus.
- 3. Only those who possess college bus pass shall travel by the college bus.
- 4. Students are permitted to travel only through the route mentioned in the Pass. Defaulters in both cases will have to pay a fine each time.
- 5. Students who are using college buses should pay for 11 months. Payment

should be made in three instalments.

6. School buses will be plied as the schedule of the school. No other arrangements will be made if buses are not available.

H. Fees

- 1. Fees shall be paid in two instalments. Fees once paid will not be refunded.
- 2. The students should keep the receipt of their fees paid for future reference.
- Students should clear all their dues to the college before collecting their admission card for the University Examination.
- 4. Fine will be collected from the defaulters.

I. Christ Scholarship Scheme (CSS)

CSS aims to recognize the students who are outstanding in academics, co-curricular & extra-curricular activities, and to assist the students who are economically backward

A review committee will scrutinize the application forms and the Principal will approve the beneficiaries under CSS. Deserving students will be awarded with the scholarship are the end of the academic year.

J. Suspension / Dismissal

Discipline is integral to education and irregular attendance, habitual disobedience, disrespecting the teachers and visitors, harassing or manhandling other students, consumption of intoxicants, dishonesty, laziness; breaches of discipline or conduct detrimental to the morale of the Institution are sufficient reasons for the suspension or dismissal of the student.

K. Regulations for Prevention and Control of Ragging

Ragging means 'Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student'.

Ragging is strictly prohibited in the campus. Inconvenience in any manner to the students, especially the 1st year students, by counterparts or senior students is a punishable offence. An anti-ragging committee is functional in the college which addresses issues related to ragging or any form of inconvenience in the campus and off campus.

The institution shall take strict action including but not limited to criminal proceeding and/or cancellation of admission against those found guilty of ragging and/or of abetting ragging and the burden of proof shall be lie on the perpetrator of alleged ragging and not on the victim. An offence of Ragging may be charged either on a written complaint by the affected or on independent finding of the Anti-Ragging Squad. College is bound by the UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions 2009."

Depending on the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Anti-Ragging Committee of the College, those found guilty of ragging shall be liable for any one or more of the following punishments. The decision of the Anti-Ragging Committee shall be final and binding.

- Cancellation of admission.
- Suspension from attending classes.
- Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fee concession and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
- Debarring from representing the College in any fest, sports or other such events.
- Expulsion from the College and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- · Payment of fine amount determined by the Anti-Ragging Committee
- In the case of offences of very serious/grievous nature, referring the case to the Police, in addition to any other punishment.
- Collective punishment where the offence is committed collectively by a group
 or by a class when it is difficult or not possible to identify specific persons.

L. Certificates

Applications for certificates viz. conduct, course, T.C. etc., must be made to the principal in writing (must be accompanied by a stamped self-addressed envelope, if the certificates have to be sent by post).

- 1. All applications for certificate should contain the following particulars:
 - · Full name of the Student.
 - Month and year of joining the college, course/class in which the student
 was originally enrolled and the date of leaving the college and the
 registration number.
 - Letter should be neatly written.

- 2. Certificates will not be normally issued within 24 hours of receiving the application.
- 3. Certificates Duplicates will be ordinarily be issued.
- 4. Transfer Certificates will not be issued if the student has any dues to the college by way of fees, fines etc.
- 5. Copies of certificates may be attested by any Gazetted officer and not necessarily by the Principal.
- 6. A nominal fee will be charged for every certificate.
- 7. Students applying for Certificates, testimonials and other documents requiring the Principal's signature should contact the College office since all the details have to be verified before the document is signed.
- 8. Migration certificate should be obtained by a student only when he/she joins another University outside Karnataka. It is to be issued by the Bangalore University. To obtain the Migration certificate, a 'No due Certificate' received from the college should be enclosed together with the application form from the University.

M. Instructions to Parents / Guardians

- Parents may kindly keep in mind that by attesting their signature to the application form at the time of admission, they are presumed to have understood and accepted all the rules and directives of the college. They are requested to read through the contents of this Handbook and be familiar with the norms of the college and procedural requirements.
- 2. They are encouraged to periodically visit the college, meet the tutor in charge and monitor the attendance and performance of their wards.
- 3. A student is required to put in at least 85% of attendance. No student is permitted to be absent for class without permission
- 4. The parents/guardians may please note that no student will be permitted to attend the university examination if he/she fails to have the required percentage of attendance. And if a student is ineligible to qualify for any two end-semester university exams due to shortage of attendance, the student will be required to leave the institution.

KNOW YOUR CAMPUS - FACILITIES

Auditorium

The fully air-conditioned Auditorium has the capacity to accommodate around three hundred people at a time and is used for important occasions.

Lecture Halls

All the Lecture halls have installed capacities like Overhead projector, sound system etc. It serves as a facility for conduct project presentations, interactive sessions, guest lectures, seminars etc.

Cafeteria

A lot of creative ideas that are conjured up in student life arise form that random conversation over food. To ensure students get that space, we have healthy hygienic space to eat at Cafeteria. College provides pure drinking water facility.

The Bank

A branch of South Indian Bank in the campus takes care of the banking needs of the college. Students and parents can avail its services if required. Students can pay all types of fees/ payments by remitting it at the SIB counter.

Laboratories

To facilitate practical sessions, the college has well equipped labs for Psychology, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Computer Science. The labs enable enhancement of the theoretical knowledge already acquired in classrooms.

Health Club

The College has a multi gym fitness centre for the students and staff in the campus.

Sports and Games

The sports and games facilities at the campus enables students attain physical growth and sportsmanship. The college has facilities for major games like basketball, football, volleyball, throw ball, cricket etc. Intra-institution and interinstitution matches and sports day give the students ample opportunity to exhibit their sports talents and skills.

Hostels

Hostel accommodation for boys is provided near to campus. Girls are also offered accommodation outside the campus at a walkable distance at a hostel run independently by the DST sisters.

Campus Store

Campus store is a one –stop shopping place for the unique requirements in an academic institution.

Prayer Hall

A prayer hall with a serene and calm atmosphere to those who wish to spend time in silence, reflection and prayer is located in in the campus.
